A reminder of the main points, for children returning to school on 1st June:

- Gates will open at 9:00 (Key Worker at 8:45). Y6 at the playground gate, Rec at the car park gate and Y1 at the CFC gate. Children to enter and line up on their own. Please do not be late. There are videos for the children to watch in their Google Classroom
- Bikes and scooters must be left at **your child's entry gate**, not in the usual place
- Children need to bring two water bottles, a pencil case and hand sanitiser (all named). No bags please though they can bring a disposable carrier bag on the first day. Pencil case and sanitiser will remain in school
- Bring a packed lunch for the first week
- Winter or summer uniform, and sun hat if sunny
- No parents allowed on-site
- Parents are expected to adhere to social distancing rules at the school gate, and leave as soon as possible. Siblings who are not in school must be kept at home (if at all possible)

If your child is unwell, in any way, they must be kept at home. Please do not put the staff, or other children, at increased risk.
